Paulina Dejmek-Hack is economic adviser to the President of the European Commission, Jean-Claude Juncker. Since joining the Commission, she has served in a variety of different positions, most significantly in the private office of former Commissioner Barnier from 2010 onwards and as Deputy Head of Cabinet in 2014.



Roberto Tamborini is a professor of economics at the University of Trento, Italy, and a senior fellow of the LUISS School of European Political Economy in Rome. His main research interests include monetary and financial economics, as well as European economic policy.



Hans Vijlbrief is Chairman of the Economic and Financial Committee and the Eurogroup Working Group. He has held positions in various government ministries and EU committees, e.g. serving as Principal Adviser to the Dutch Minister of Finance and as Chairman of the Board of Directors of the EFSF until 2018.



Silke Wettach is an EU correspondent for the German business weekly „Wirtschaftswoche“. She has received numerous accolades for her work as a journalist, including the Ludwig Erhard Stiftung's award for young journalists and a grant from the U.S. State Department. She holds a Master's degree in economics.

Reforming the Eurozone: Prospects and Challenges

Wednesday, 2 May 2018, 12 – 2 pm

Several proposals on how to change the institutions of the euro area have been put forward. Emmanuel Macron has fuelled hopes with his call for a “new deal for the eurozone”. In a similar same vein, President of the European Commission Jean-Claude Juncker has proposed the creation of a “European Minister of Economy and Finance” and suggested that the euro area have its own separate section within the EU budget.

Against the backdrop of these fervently discussed potential reforms, this Lunch Debate which is jointly organised by ZEW and EconPol will consider a number of questions. These include: creating an EMU reform package that not only makes economic sense but which both Northern and Southern Europe can agree on; finding a way to effectively combine stabilising elements with elements that ensure a certain degree of self-reliance; precisely defining the responsibilities of a potential European finance minister; determining the main priorities of a euro area budget. We will present key findings on these questions based on a paper conducted by EconPol, a network of leading European research institutes.
